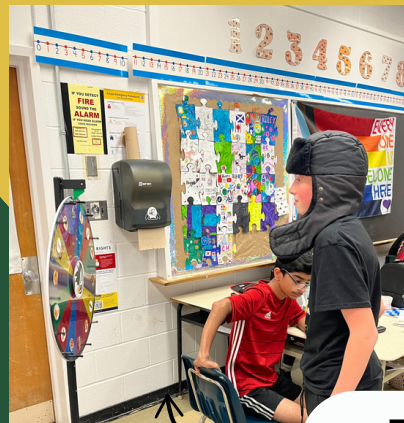

DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in preschool and kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10%, or about 2 days each month over the course of a school year, can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just one or two days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Eventually good attendance will be a skill that will help them succeed in high school and college.

We are all born free & equal

The Limestone District
School Board is committed to

Everyone is entitled to these rights

The Code recognizes that all people:
• Have human rights that cannot be
infringed upon or dismissed.
• Have individual dignity and worth.
• Are entitled to equal rights and
opportunities without
discrimination.

Respecting human rights is a collective responsibility

We all have a part to play in ensuring that
everyone's human rights are respected.



Everyone has the right to live in freedom & safety

The Ontario Human Rights Code prohibits
discrimination on the following grounds:

- Age
- Ancestry, colour, race
- Citizenship
- Creed
- Disability / Perceived disability
- Discrimination because of association
- Ethnic origin
- Family status / Marital status (incl. single status)
- Gender identity and gender expression
- Place of origin
- Religion
- Sex
- Sexual orientation

Your human rights are legally protected

The Ontario Human Rights Code is
the human rights law in Ontario.
You are legally protected from
discrimination based on any of
these grounds and have a right to
an environment free from
discrimination.

If you believe your human rights or someone else's have been violated



Submit a human rights incident or
complaint by using the **Student
Human Rights Incidents and
Complaints** form or by talking to
your teacher, Principal, Vice-Principal,
or any LDSB employee.
